With gorgeous sunny skies and a perfect 10-12 knot breeze out of the southwest, twenty-three boats in three classes competed for trophies in the top three positions as well as ECSA points. Classes included Cruising Canvas, Spinnaker, and the Design Ensigns. Race Committee One responsibilities were performed by good friends The Mudheads aboard the Eddie Maxwell, while mark boat duties fell to Fred Allard on Beakle, with Sam Greenfield aboard as official regatta photographer. MRYC yachts chose to venture out at different times for the various activities surrounding the OpSail 2012 weekend, so it was a fairly loosely-organized cruise. Some fell in with the Parade of Sail on Saturday morning, July 7th, or caught the fireworks at Mason's Island Yacht Club that evening, while Dom

DeGaetano and I in Dom's Catalina 36 *Mary O*. wended our way over to Niantic Bay on Friday the 6^{th} to see some of the vessels arriving.

Already at anchor was the stately USCGC Eagle, the United States' official tall ship. Also anchored were a Coast Guard 82-foot patrol boat and the beautiful classic

ketch *Ticonderoga*, while Mystic Seaport's schooner *Brilliant* kept herself under sail, a very pleasant sight.



But what many dozens in boats and hundreds crowding the shore had come to see was the Navy's USS Carter Hall, a Harper's Ferry-class dock landing ship that was carrying a state-of-the-art landing craft in her stern bay. When Carter Hall appeared on the horizon, she looked like any other gray-painted naval vessel. But once she was anchored and the bay had been opened, we were able to sail around her and peer inside where two huge air foil propellers only suggested the size of the landing craft that was promised to be deployed at 1600 hours.

Sure enough, at precisely 1600 (it's nice to know that somebody does something precisely on time these days), the landing craft was

> launched from its mother ship. Even at a distance, we could tell that the LCAC (Landing Craft Air Cushion) was an enormous machine a rigid inflatable large enough to carry several trucks and propelled the same way an Everglades airboat is. When the propellers roared to life, the craft sent up spray

so dense that it often completely obscured the LCAC from view. And it was loud. Really loud.

Designed as an amphibious assault craft, the LCAC can reach speeds of 40 knots fully loaded and so can storm a beach, even with all the noise, drop its ramp and disgorge its payload of men and materiel before an enemy knows what hit them. While *Carter Hall*'s LCAC came in more slowly, it was still awfully impressive as it skimmed the water into Niantic Bay and ran right up onto the beach at McCook Point Park, there to off-load trucks and an admiral who was to take part in Niantic's portion of the OpSail celebration.

It was a fine afternoon of sailing and

certainly included a "Nowthere'ssomethingyou-don'tsee-everyday" experience.
